## AAIE Esperanto keyboard layout for Mac OS X

The U.S. ExtEsp keyboard layout is an alternative to the standard Mac OS X keyboard layout that permits you to type easily in Esperanto and in addition to type almost any letter in almost any language written with the Latin alphabet. Use of this keyboard layout will not normally interfere with typing in English, so it can be used all the time.

Note that this works only with Mac OS X for laptop and desktop computers, not iOS for iPads and iPhones or with Windows, Linux, etc. For information on typing in Esperanto in other operating systems, see this Wikipedia page:

### *Installing the keyboard layout file*

In order to install the keyboard layout you must first download the compressed folder containing it from this address: <http://aaie.us/downloads/MacKeyboardLayout.zip>, if you have not already down so.

Usually the downloaded file will be stored in your computer's Downloads folder. If not, you can search for it using Spotlight, usually invoked with Command-Spacebar.

On some computers the downloaded file will automatically be unzipped to create the folder MacKeyboardLayout. If not, you can double-click on the file MacKeyboardLayout.zip to unzip it.

Inside the folder should be a file named "U.S. ExtEsp.bundle". Drag this file into the Keyboard Layouts folder in your computer's Library folder. (If there is not already a folder named Keyboard Layouts inside the Library folder, simply create one.) Since the Library folder is protected you will be asked to "authenticate" the change by entering your administrator password.


If you don't know the administrator password you can instead install the keyboard layout in your private Library folder, though in that case it will not be accessible to other users of the same computer if they have separate user IDs.

To install the keyboard layout in your private Library, go to the Finder (for example, by clicking on your desktop) and select "Go to Folder" from the Finder menu (or type Shift-Command-G), then in the resulting dialog box type ~/Library. (The ~ character is just to the left of the 1 key on most keyboards.) Note that in newer versions of OS X your private Library file is not normally visible in the Finder, so you must use the Go to Folder method to reach it.

### *Activating the keyboard layout*

In order to activate the keyboard layout file you must first restart your computer to make OS X aware of the change to the Library folder.

After restarting your computer to make OS X aware of the new contents of the Keyboard Layouts folder, click on the Apple icon at the top left of the screen and on the resulting menu choose “System Preferences...” On the System Preferences dialog click “Language & Text” (“International” in Leopard, OS X 10.5, and earlier). Next click the “Input Sources” button at the top, and you should see something like the dialog box below. (If you don’t, double-check that you have selected “Input Sources”)



On the left you will see a list of keyboard layouts corresponding to various languages. Scroll down to “U.S. ExtEsp” (usually near the bottom) and put a checkmark next to it. Also make sure that there is a check next to “Show Input menu in menu bar” at the bottom. You can then quit System Preferences.

You should now see in the menu bar near the top right of the screen a keyboard icon possibly looking like a keyboard and possibly like a flag, like this (but not necessarily in the same position):



To finish activating the new keyboard layout, click on the icon and from the resulting menu choose “U.S. ExtEsp”. The icon will now change to a flag with an E underneath. You’re now ready to use the keyboard layout.
